

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COMPETENCE EXAM AT B2 LEVEL- information for candidates for studies at TUL

General information for candidates:

- The English language competence exam at B2 level consists of 2 parts: written and oral.
 Candidates who failed the written part will not be invited to take the oral part of the exam.
- In order to take the written part of the exam, the candidates need to create an account on the WIKAMP PORT platform. The link to the instructions on how to create the account will be provided to the candidates in the Candidate's Portal.
- 3. The exam takes place online on the designated day and time. The link to the exam will also be included in the Candidate's Portal.
- 4. The exam will remain open for 4 hours, however, the candidates will have 70 min. to solve it.
- 5. The candidates will not receive any score immediately after the attempt, but those who passed the written part (55% of correct answers) will receive a link to MS Teams meeting for the oral part in the Candidate's Portal.
- 6. The oral part of the exam will be scheduled within 1 working day after the written part. Once the candidate joins the meeting, they are requested to remain available in the Lobby until they are allowed in.
- 7. The candidates are required to have their **identification document** with them as they will be asked to show it to the camera.
- 8. The candidate's **overall** score from the exam will be published on the Admissions website according to the admissions timetable.

- Task 1: Multiple-choice (5p.)
- Task 2: Speaker-to-sentence matching (5p.)
- Task 3: Gap-filling (5p.)

Reading comprehension

- Task 4: Match statements to sections (5p.)
- Task 5: Match sentences to gaps (5p.)
- Task 6: Multiple-choice (a, b, c, d) (5p.)

Use of English

- Task 7: Multiple-choice (a, b, c, d) (8p.)
- Task 8: Word formation (5p.)
- Task 9: Transformations (5p.)

Written forms comprehension

- Task 10: Gap-filling (10p.)

Exam format: the oral part (approx. 20 min.)

- 1. Task 1- warm-up/interview questions- the examiner asks at least 2 questions related to the candidate's character, skills, studies, or experience. This part should last up to 5 min.
- 2. Task 2- topic presentation- the examiner gives the candidate a topic for a short presentation together with some visual material. The candidate has 2 minutes to prepare (they can make hand-written notes), and then 2 minutes to present their topic. This part should last up to 5 min.
- 3. Task 3- discussion- the examiner asks the candidate 2 questions about their presentation. This part should last up to 5 min.
